SIR JOHN A. MacDONALD TROPHY

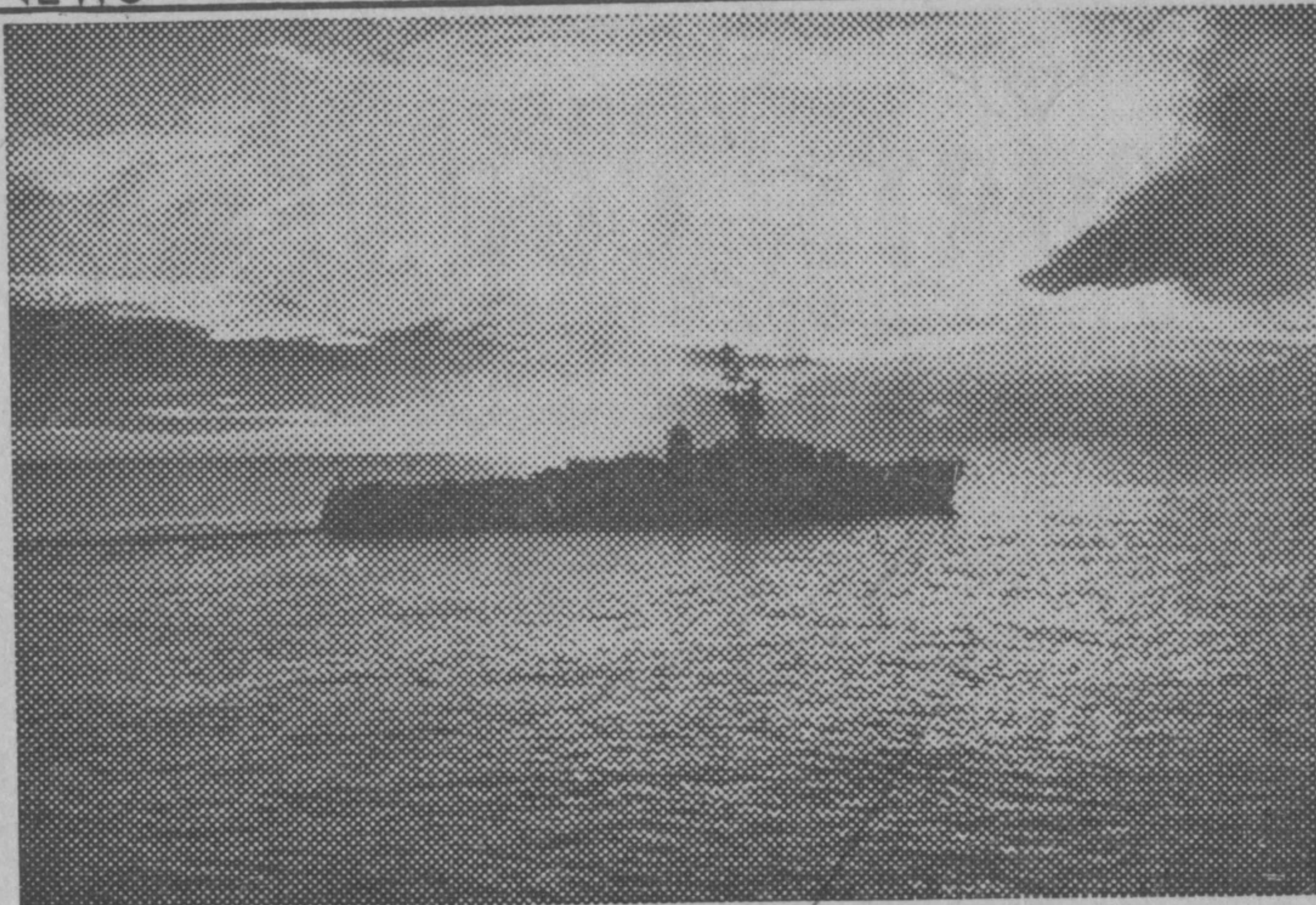
