SUMMER COURSE IN LIBRARY WORK

H. M. Ermel and Miss Gwen Hadley agreed to continue as chairman and secretary-treasurer, respectively of Schreiber Public Library Board.

They were given a sincere vote of appreciation for the hours spent in the library service in a voluntary capacity.

Miss Hadley said that T. Farthing, regional consultant will be bringing a selection of new books to Schreiber and Board members agreed to purchase \$100 worth if the selection warrants it. The bookmobile will be in Schreiber from 1:30 - 4:30 p.m. March 19.

A letter from A. G. Pepper, director Northwestern Regional Library System asked if there was any interest in a non-credit summer course in library work. He also agreed to pay 50 per cent subsidy to libraries willing to employ a partly-qualified library technologist in the summer months.

Mrs. Andrea Hill was re-appointed librarian and Mrs. Inez McCuaig, public relations officer. All Board members will act as a book selection committee.

Meeting nights will be held the first Saturday of each month. Library hours are Monday, Tuesday and Saturday, 2-5 p.m.; Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday, closed and Friday, 2-5 p.m. and 7-9 p.m.

Three signing officers, Mr. Ermel, Miss Hadley and Mrs. M. J. McGrath were appointed.

Additional shelves will be ordered but advice will be asked of regional consultant regarding the merits of the various types.

Mrs. Hill reported that users of Interlocking Loan Service have been most appreciative of the service.

Hearing of the wide activity in social work, outside of their own parish, carried on by the local Catholic Women's League, a Mrs. H. Davis in Detroit became interested and regularly sends a contribution of used stamps. On one occasion, while driving through, she delivered a large box personally to Mrs. Ted Morrow.
