Principal, Mrs. Price notified the board that the regional board would re-roof the school and build cement entrance steps. She also announced that she received a 3400. dollar increase from the new board. Mrs. Todesco commented on the high standard of school equipment the best since the new building was opened. It was noted that there are close to a thousand library books for the pupil's use, over six hundred text book plus much other equipment.

It was noted that the bus driver, janitor and maintenance man will continue their respective work in conjunction with the school. The Board adjourned with pleasant reminders of accomplished improvements at the school and having worked in close harmony with the teacher, rate payers and each other.
