



#### MARRIED IN COMMUNITY CHURCH

At a double ring ceremony held in Terrace Bay Community Church at 7 p.m. on Saturday July 12, 1969, Bonnie Lea Hamilton eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Hamilton became the bride of Lloyd George Phillips, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Phillips, all of Terrace Bay, Ontario.

Green and white snap dragons decorated the church and lighted candles were placed on the window ledges and altar. The ceremony was performed by Rev. T. Garnett Husser. Soloist was Miss Joanne Brown and organ music was provided by Mrs. C. Simmer.

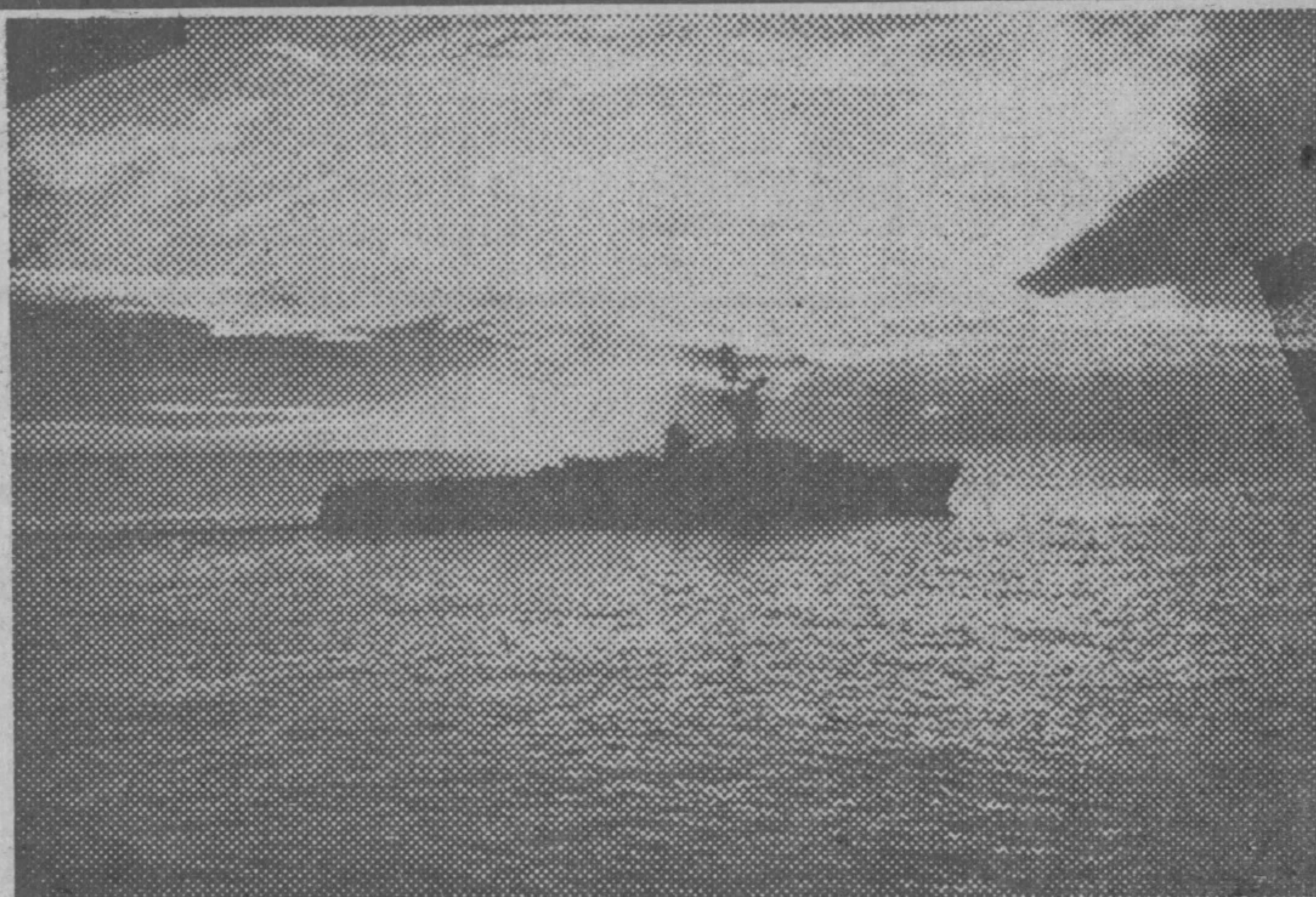
Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a mid-victorian styled gown of nylon organza over taffeta with re-embroidered French lace. The yoke and standing collar of the gown were lace trimmed also the long tight cuffs of the full length puffy sleeves. A wide band of lace also bordered the hem of the gown and edged the Cathedral train which fell in soft folds from the shoulders. She wore a Chapel length tulle veil with scalloped edges and carried a bouquet of white gladiolas with mint green centres.

Attending the bride were her sister Marcia as maid of honour, the groom's sister Shirley, and Barbara Hubbard as senior bridesmaids and another of the groom's sisters, Norma, as Junior Bridesmaids. Their gowns were made of mint green peau de charme in Princess style with jewel necklines and a deep pleat in the back which dropped to form a train. They wore matching hair bows and carried nosegays of yellow shasta daisies.

Flower girl Heather Nugent wore a floor length dress of flocked white nylon over mint green taffeta, the full skirt made in tiers. She carried a basket of shasta daisies, and wore a head piece of matching daisies.

A cut-work cloth, used at the bride's parents wedding, covered the table which held the four tier wedding cake which was iced with touches of mint green. A silver vase belonging to the bride's grandmother held an arrangement of shasta daisies and snap dragons.

Leaving for a honeymoon to eastern points the bride donned a navy blue and white sheath with navy tunic and navy accessories. She wore a pink carnation corsage. The couple will reside in Sarnia.

Previous to her marriage the bride was honoured at a shower held in the Community Church and the groom's parents entertained a rehearsal party.

The groom's sister Beverley was unable to attend but phoned from B.C. during the reception.

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
