ONE LEGGED SKATER

A prized possession Ed Nicol's is a program of a show given by a one-legged skater in the Schreiber rink on March 1st, 1926, which Mr. Nicol came in from Jackfish to attend. The admission was 55¢ for adults and 27¢ for children, with free skating following the show.

The star was Norman A. Falkner, of Toronto, billed as the only one-legged skater in the world. Mr. Falkner had lost his right leg above the knee as the result of wounds received at Lens, France during the Great War (so written on program).

Mr. Falkner gave exhibitions of the following figures - the beek star with loop centre, double three eight, double beek star, four bracket eight double dorsscut star, and counter and three eight.

The Halifax Herald, Toronto Telegram, Calgary Herald, Peterborough Examiner, Fredericton Gleaner, Saskatoon Star, and Duluth New Tribune, reported enthusiastically about the performance of Mr. Falkner.
