A discount shall be allowed on any prepayment of 1970 taxes made prior to the tax due date of July 2nd, 1970.

Allowable Discounts:

- 3% on all payments prior to February 1, 1970
- 2 1/2% on all payments prior to March 1, 1970
- 2% on all payments prior to April 1, 1970

These discounts reduce by 1/2% per month up to and until June 30, 1970.
