

Board of Education Meeting - cont'd from page II

The Director of Education was authorized to engage the services of a Specialist in Special Education to carry on a program of early testing and to assist the teachers in their remedial and developmental programs.

The matter of obtaining the services of a Maintenance Supervisor will be carried over to the March board meeting. A committee was set up to make recommendations regarding this item.

The resignation of Mr. S. Chawla of Terrace Bay High School staff, effective the 27th of June, was accepted with regret.

It was decided to repair the school bus which is the property of the Board at an approximate cost of \$750.00. This bus is used extensively for field trips.

Application will be made to the Thunder Bay Health Unit to consider the inclusion of Heron Bay North and South in its area of jurisdiction. Heron Bay is presently served by the Health Unit located in Sault Ste. Marie.

The Ontario Paper Company has advised the Board that the Heron Bay South Townsite, including the pumping station and sewage system, will be closed prior to September 1st, 1970. The Director is to prepare a recommendation on the future of the Heron Bay school for the March board meeting.

Preliminary drawings for a shop addition to the Manitowadge High School to accommodate eighty pupils were submitted to the Trustees for comment.

The Board was notified by Mr. Ferrier, Mill Manager of Kimberly Clark Pulp & Paper Company, Terrace Bay, that it is quite likely that Kimberly Clark will not be able to provide heating for the Terrace Bay Public School and the old part of the High School; therefore, the Board will have to make arrangements for an alternative supply within the next two or three years.

The next meeting of the Board will take place in the Marathen High School Library on Wednesday, March 11th, at 7:00 p.m.
