HISTORICAL ITEMS SEEN AT OPEN HOUSE

A large crowd took in the Open House at the school Wednesday evening when parents and neighbours viewed student projects on pollution, art and craftwork, rock collections, polished stones (some mounted in jewellery) and stones being found in this area. The Indian artifacts on display were a popular attraction, among them being an Indian Tikinagon cradle board, a bean pot and a carved wooden laddle for lifting boiled food from a pot.

The history display of the collection of antiques many over 100 years old drew favorable comment. Among articles on display were silver tea services, butter dishes, copper teapots and kettles, wine funnels, wood carving, oil paintings on China, Jewellery box, religious articles, fans, china dishes, and a 1902 school register. Teachers that year were Miss Alice Barker and H.L. Cameron. In September and October, the school was closed due to Diptheria epidemic which caused the death of several children.

An 1903 assessment roll ledger was another interesting item of local history which showed much of

the village was still in the hands of the Hudson Bay Company. It showed property valued from \$50 to \$1200. Property owners listed were J. Healey, Chas McKay, A. Legault, T. Craigie, Peter Perron, W. Boon, Geo. Gerow, F. Dampier, E. Bruley, A. Sutherland, Isaac Hunter, The two churches, T. Williams, R. Weber, J. Ratwell, J. Paulmer, Geo Sills, K. McLeod. It looks as if a D. McCaig was the assessor but the signature is barely visible.

A film "The Group of Seven" was shown.
