FUNERAL HELD FOR THE LATE A. BERNDTSSON

Eric Axel Berndtsson passed away in Port Arthur Hospital on August 31, 1971.

Axel was born Feb. 4, 1921, in Sweden and came to Canada as a young boy. He lived in Eagle River, prior to joining the Armed Services. He came to Terrace Bay in 1949, where he was employed by Kimberly-Clark for 21 years. He married the former Elsie Montey in 1946, and is survived by his wife, a daughter Holly, granddaughter Jennifer, one brother Alfred and a sister Anna. He was pre-deceased by his parents, one sister and a son.

He was a member of the Terrace Bay Masonic Lodge the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 223, and a member of the Community Church, where he had been an Elder and on the Official Church Board.

Funeral services were held in the Community Church on Friday, September 3, at 11 A.M. with Reverend Peter McKague officiating. The casket was draped with the Canadian Flag.
