Anyone with a lung problem as a result of being hooked on tobacco can fill you in on its merits as a pacifier.




PENINSULA RACEWAY NEWS

SPIKE RUSH AND SLOUGH GRASS

A — Spike Rushes (Elcocharis sp.) common plants bordering marshes and sloughs in wet mud but also grow abundantly in shallow water. Characterized by tapering leafless stem which terminates in a single spike. The seeds are tiny but together with the tubers and rootstock are valuable duck food. B — Slough Grass (Beckmannia syzigahne) common to wetlands bordering marshes, often in association with sedge. The slender stem is tipped with a series of spikes growing close to the stalk. Each consists of compact one-sided spikelets. Not an important duck food but seeds are eaten. Provides nesting cover.
