

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR C.W. TODESCO

Funeral services for Charles W. Todesco, age 82 years, resident of Rosspport who died Wednesday, February 28th were held Monday afternoon from Sargent and Son's Funeral Home after lying in state at the family home in Rosspport to St. Berchman's Roman Catholic Church Monday at 2 p.m. with concelebrants parish priest F.J. Meyer, former parish priests J.M. Cano, E.A. Gallagher of Thunder Bay and Dean A.R. Greengrass of Terrace Bay officiating. Schreiber choir was in attendance. Interment was in the St. Berchman's Roman Catholic Cemetery.

SUPERIOR VOICE

Semestered System at Lake Superior High School:

In September, 1973, Lake Superior High School will commence on a full credit semester system.

The semester system is merely a time device whereby the school year is divided into two equal parts, each five months in length. A student completes one half of his total year's courses during the first semester (the first five months). In the second semester he then studies the remaining courses.

The content of each course remains basically the same, and has the same time allocation in total, but is compressed into a five month period. At the present time Lake Superior High School operates on a ten period day, each 36 minutes in length. A student earns one credit if he successfully completes a course involving one period a day for the entire year. On the full credit semestered system there will be 5 or 6 periods a day each 60 or 65 minutes in length. A student earns a credit if he successfully completes a course involving one period a day for 5 months.

One of the advantages of the system is that a student is working on only three or four courses at a time. This fact and the shorter term provide incentive for more continuous effort and achievement. Acceleration and enrichment programs are also more feasible under the semestered system.

A student who is not doing well in his program has the opportunity to change his program
