

TERRACE BAY AGAIN RECEIVES O.F.Y. GRANT

In 1973, Opportunities for Youth, again invited the youth of Canada to participate with the government in serving their communities. The participants were asked to work together in small groups to initiate, plan, and implement creative and useful community service projects. These summer time projects should help the participants to support themselves, finance their education and promote personal and social development. In addition to helping communities, the O.F.Y. program gives youth an opportunity to learn (through direct experience) how to work with other community organizations, local resource people, and government departments.

One such program, evaluated and accepted by the O.F.Y. branch, will be the implimentation of a craft room in the Terrace Bay Campus. Plans were made and are still being made for certain creative projects, activities and constructions. Among the many proposed will be sessions on rug hooking, weaving, batiking, dyeing, beading, candle making, recycling of found or previously used materials and various other projects. The community, as a whole, will be invited to participate and it is hoped that there will be not only personal achievement but also community interaction!

We are also planning outdoor exhibits, puppet shows, paint-ins, sketching jaunts, and Monday night demonstrations made by community residents.
