In Salem, Ore., 15-year-old Robert Hehlen broke the world record for pogo stick jumping. Young Bob apparently hopped 14,675 times - and there were counters and witnesses there to watch him. It took him two hours and 19 minutes. The Guinness Book of World Records lists the old record as 11,052 jumps, set by 12-year-old Stephen Newman of Great Haywood, England, in June of 1971.

In Rio de Janeiro, meanwhile, Adilson Ribeiro Troca also is claiming a world record, but he'd rather someone else owned it. He says that during the last three years he has been held up 42 times by gunmen while driving to the bank with his company's earnings.
