

## TERRACE BAY POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

A total of seventeen occurrences were investigated by the Terrace Bay Police Department during the past week.

On November 25th a break, enter and theft was reported at a local residence, where the occupant's purse and money was stolen. The following day a juvenile was charged with break, enter and theft.

David, 4 years old, is a healthy, slim, active boy with blonde hair (even blonder in summer), blue eyes and fair skin.

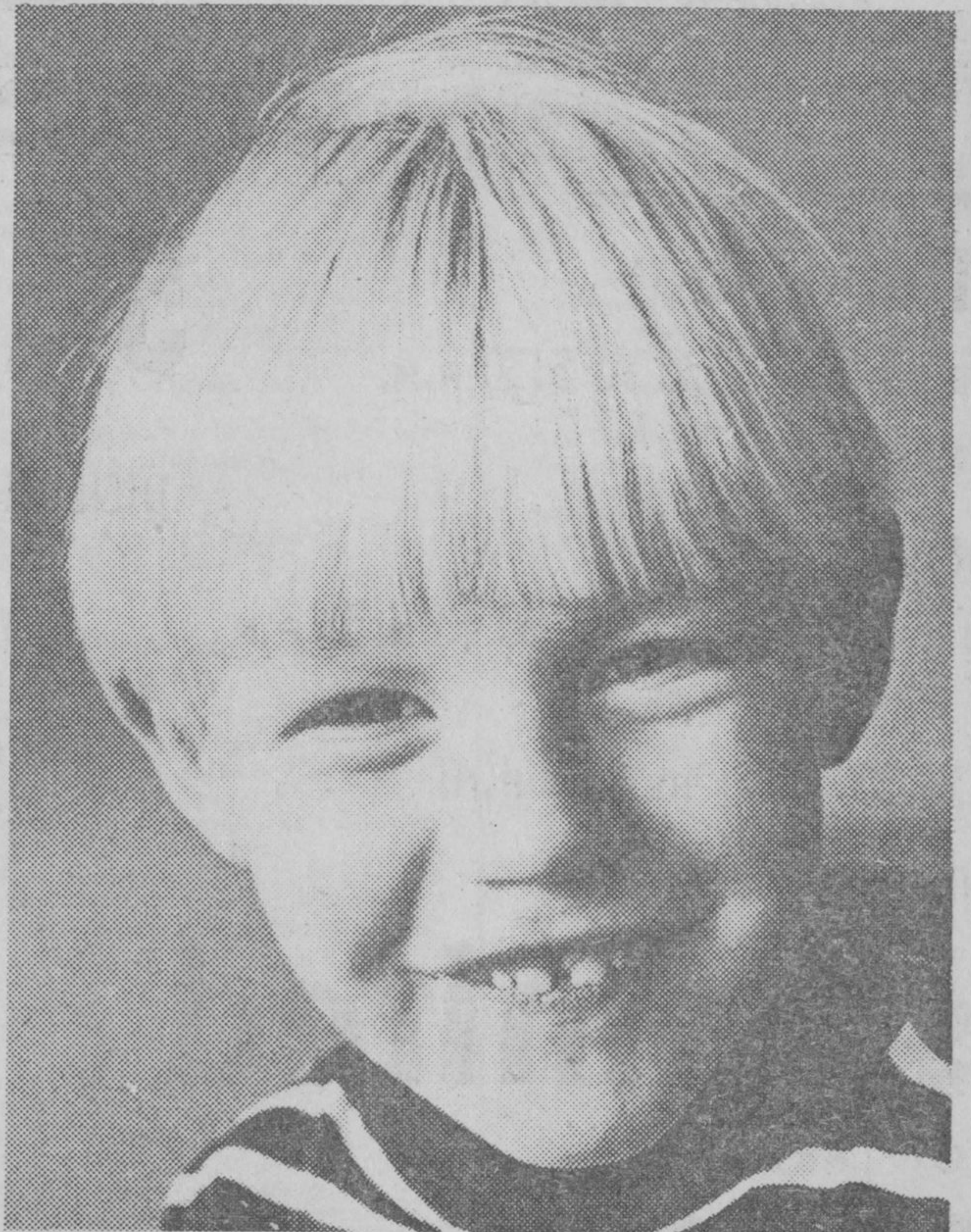
He attends nursery school with other children his age and loves it, but is not expected to be able to go on in the academic stream as he gets older. He will need special education.
