great benefits for man's food production they can be a liability if misused. "Mishandling has had serious consequences such as the killing of benevolent plants or insects outside the intended target," he emphasized.

"Figures supplied by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food reveal that in 1972, \$150,000 worth of insured crops were destroyed by misuse of these crop-protecting products," he said. Estimates indicate that this loss was reduced to less than \$50,000 in 1973.

Mr. Biggs went on to comment on the penchant of some to overlook the benefits of pesticides use, seeing only dangers from their abuse. "When there is a car accident, people always investigate to see where the driver made his mistake. In the case of an accident involving pest control products, the immediate reaction is that these products are at fault and are too dangerous to use.

"If we use these substances, if we agree that they must be used, then they must be used wisely," he concluded.
