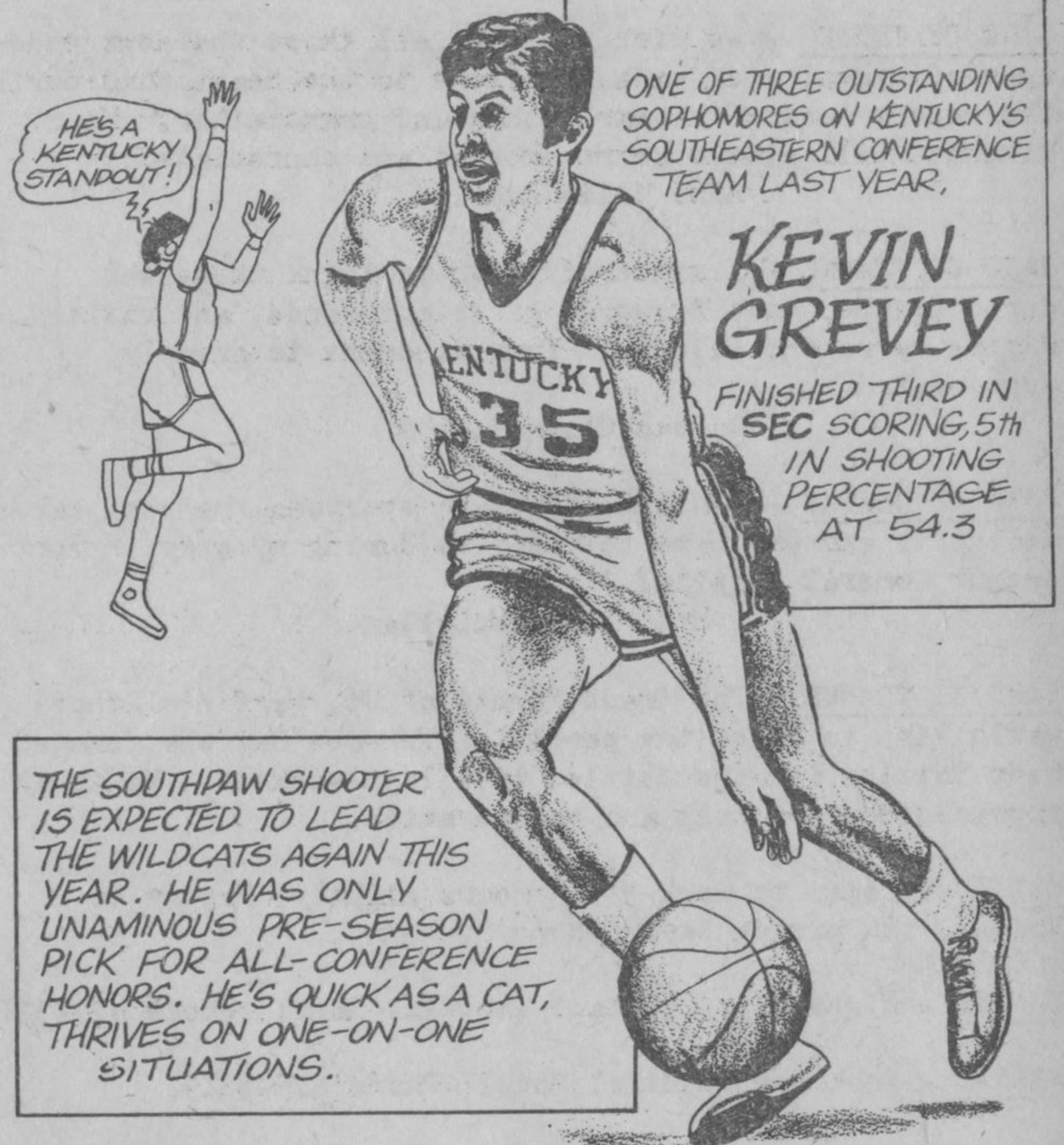

**Great Lakes**

The biggest of the Great Lakes, the well-named Superior, accounts for nearly a third of the total: 31,700 square miles. It holds 2,935 cubic miles of water, and its depth at one point drops to 1,333 feet, making it the deepest of the five.
