## OOD YEAR FOR NORTHERN AFFAIRS OFFICE

With 1973 now history, the Northern Affairs anch of the Ministry of Natural Resources in look back on a year of accomplishment.

During 1973 the twenty-three office locations of Northern Affairs handled a total of 2,975 transactions. This compares with 0,958 in 1972. The nine field office locations in Northwestern Ontario accounted for 7,914 of the 1973 total.

Ignormal saw an increased use of Northern fairs facilities by both the Public and rovincial and Federal Government representatives. The Northern Affairs offices are being tilized to a greater extent each year by oth provincial ministries and federal departents as a back-up to their service in locations where they do not have an office, but here a Northern Affairs officer is located. This practice allows for better servicing of the remote areas through one central location.

Northern Affairs is basically an information centre for the provincial government and myone requiring information or assistance can contact the Northern Affairs Officer in Marathon by telephoning 229-II53 or visiting their office location at Lower Floor, Peninsula Building, Marathon, Ontario.
