**HOCKEY HELMET STANDARDS**

The Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs has put legislative stiffening in hockey helmet production. It has developed a safety regulation under the Hazardous Products Acts to govern the selling, advertising and importing of hockey helmets.

The effect is to ensure hockey helmets worn on the ice by over 750,000 youngsters in Canada will provide greater protection from injury. Helmets approved by the regulations, which became effective on January 1, have sturdier plastic shells to resist impacts and prevent puncturing. The new helmets will also more effectively cover a larger area of the head.

Most of the old helmets did not meet the new standards set out under the Hazardous  
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
