On May 21st, a different method of reforestation was employed. In approximately five hours a Bell G-4 helicopter equipped with a Brohm seeding unit, aerially seeded jack pine on 400 acres of scarified cutover in the Macutagon River block, north east of Manitouwadge. This required approximately eleven million jack pine seeds.

The tree seed used in projects such as this, is obtained from people employed as cone pickers, who collect the seed-bearing cones found in fresh logging slash. At the present time, and throughout the summer, crews of students go out on weekends to pick cones in pre-selected areas. Their efforts will replenish seed stocks used for aerial seeding and the production of nursery stock.
