There is a strong possibility that construction will start in 1976.

Finances for this project are urgently needed.

It is estimated that \$400,000 total must be raised locally.

The Government of Canada supports this project by donating \$4.00 for every \$10.00 donated by residents, local organizations and businesses. Monies raised by taxation are not classified as donations.

It is not the intent of the Municipal Councils of Schreiber and Terrace Bay to totally finance the one-sixth of the hospital's cost. However, they will assist us whenever the residents indicate their support by generous donation.

The Board has approval to build.

The Board has approval for an excellent program of health services.

The Board is about to move into the design and construction stages.

ALBERT SMITH FUNERAL



The funeral of the late Albert Smith, aged 84, whose death occurred on March 5th, was conducted in Holy Angels Roman Catholic Church in Schreiber on March 8th by the Rev. F.J. Meyer with Miss Mary Bourke as organist.

In addition to the church services, the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 109, conducted its service at the King Funeral Home, with the Rev. F. J. Meyer also offering prayers for the family. Pall bearers were George Birch, Tom Bolan, Tommy Bolan, John Power, Denny and Russell Macadam, Active bearers were Caccamo, Wallace McCouan, Ivan Martin, and Rene Bedard and Borden Ross. The casket was in Schreiber Cemetery.

Albert's immediate survivors are his former wife, Maggie Hawker; four daughters (Illa Poirier of St. Peterborough, Fla.; Mrs. W. Kirkpatrick) of Schreiber; Margaret Smith and Nellie (Mrs. Don Stewart) of Terrace Bay.

There are also nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren, and a brother, Joseph of Kent, England.

Mr. Smith came directly from England to Schreiber in 1909 from his birthplace, Swanscombe, Kent, England and in 1915 was married to Miss Hawker. He served with the 52 Battalion in World War I. In 1930 he moved his family to Dorion, returning to Schreiber in 1941, and retired from the C.P.R. as an engineer in 1955.

Mr. Smith's chief characteristic was his gentleness and his absolute devotion, his home and family, and love and communication with other small children. There was always a playhouse in the Smith yard, where hordes of small neighbours met, enjoying endless tea parties, and vigorous house-cleanings and redecorations, in which Albert always took part.

Attending the service from out of town were Kevin Kirkpatrick, Miss Deborah Stewart, and Peter Dube, of Thunder Bay.
