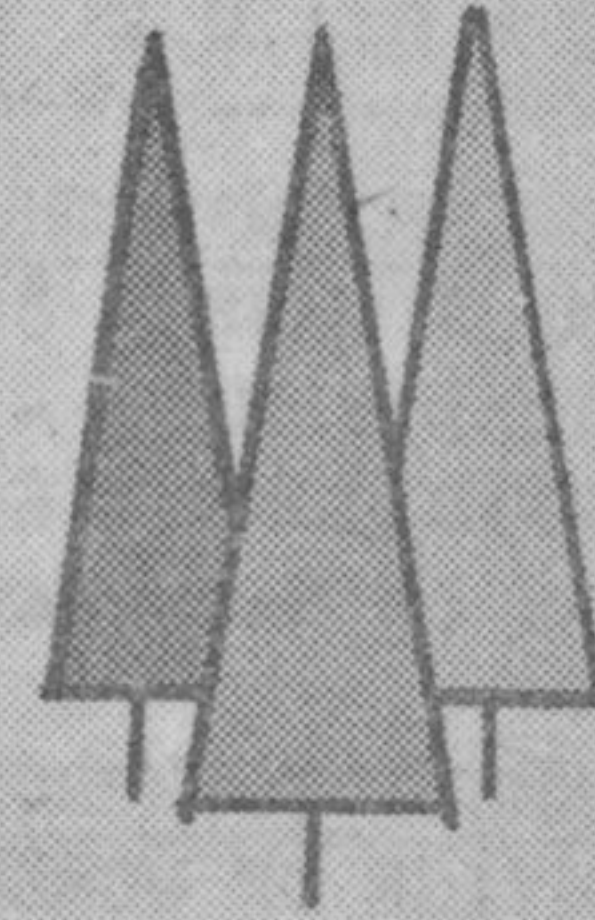
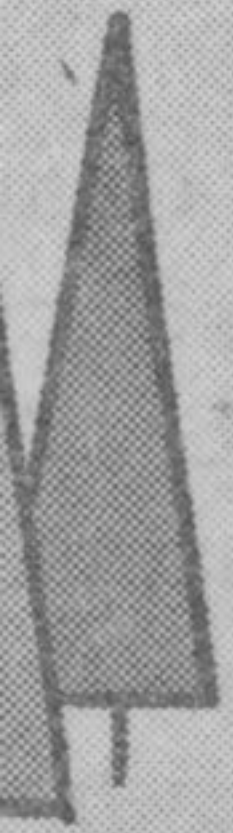

LOCAL LANDMARK TO BE DEMOLISHED



A known landmark in Terrace Bay is to disappear. The old Railway Section House at the East end of town on the superior side of Highway #17, is being demolished.

The house was built in 1920, and was lived in by a family who worked on the Railway. The early construction workers of Kimberly-Clark knew the house as Black Siding until 1946 when it was called Terrace Bay, and it was a busy station in those days.

LAKE SUPERIOR NAVIGATION SEASON OPEN

The time has arrived for the opening of the navigational season for shipping in Lake Superior.
