they had no electricity and they had to pump water from a well under the house. The children of the town thought the old place was haunted because as Aili went about her house in the evenings she carried an oil lamp from room to room with her.

Daisy an elder girl was about Grade II, and being a teenager she always wanted to be as cute as the next girl, but almost cried every-time she had to iron her things with a flat iron heated on the woodstove. Here they were on the doorstep of a new model town and living without Hydro or Electricity.

Mrs. Lehto managed for four years then she decided to write to Mr. Crump the President of C.P.R. and explained that she needed electricity, and within two months her wish was granted and in November 1960 she once again enjoyed modern living and her fridge and cooker that had been stored away for four years were once again in use.

Oliver the son worked at the Railway Station and so hadn't very far to walk to work, but the baby of the family Doris in Grade I had to snow-shoe to school in the winter. It was a long hike for a youngster, so instead of trying to travel home at noon her mother packed a lunch for her and a kind friend in town had her home with her own children.

During the years in the house the Lehto's saw the construction of Highway #17. This went right between the Station and their house, the large overpass
