The Hon Kelso A. Roberts announced renently that lake Superior is now closed to angling for lake trout except under the authority of a licence. Commencing on July 30 all lake trout fishermen will be required to obtain a licence to angle for lake trout on lake Superior and to submit a report on their catch to the Department. He further noted that the licence which is provided free of charge is valid for a period of 30 days and may be renewed as required. Mr. Roberts explained "the new regulation was established to facilitate the management of the important lake trout fishery on lake Superior".
