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gnized their responsibility as free men and were ready to shoulder that responsibility so that others could be free. And in the exercise of this responsibility they were ready to pay for it with their lives.

Far too many today look on freedom as a license, a license to destroy private and public property, a license to "do as you please" without any accountability, a license to call people derrogatory names. These people fail to recognize what freedom means because they fail as individuals to accept their responsibility as citizens, fail to recognize their responsibility as human beings.

If we as Canadians wish to honour the memory of those who died in war, the souls of those men whose bodies now lie buried in foreign lands, then we must be convinced they died believing in a better future for mankind. If we do this and work for that future, a lasting peace in the world, they will not have died in vain."

The Legion has proposed June 6 as another day for the laying of the wreaths, with an appropriate ceremony.
