

Smoke Detectors - continued

Ontario Government in 1976, stipulates that all new residential dwellings must have ionization detectors wired into the electrical system, the minister said.

Units available for existing houses include battery operated and plug-in units as well as the electrically-connected types.

Prices range from about \$40 to \$80 for the units.

The Ontario Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations has produced an information sheet about smoke detectors, their installation, operation and maintenance.
