**FIRST AID TIP**

from

**IF SOMEONE IS CHOKING**

- Remove any obvious obstructions such as food, gum and false teeth by sweeping the finger around inside the mouth and throat
- If the casualty is an infant, hold it up by the legs and smack it smartly 3 or 4 times between the shoulders. It should dislodge any foreign body
- Give artificial respiration if necessary
- If the casualty is a child, lay it over your knee head downwards. Give it 3 or 4 slaps between the shoulders to dislodge the obstruction. Apply artificial respiration if necessary. Use the same method on an adult except make the "slaps", "sharp blows" instead.
