Reeve H.J. McParland commented on the renovations to the Legion.

Major A.E. Mailey, the guest speaker, dwelt on the subject that people are not our enemies regardless of their nationality or their color. The world is now a global village, so, we must think of others as entitled to a decent life, such as we enjoy. Our enemy is in our own selfish, greedy natures. We are born with the spiritual misuse of power.

Georgina Davis, auxiliary president, said they had spent five thousand dollars on renovating the Club. She then presented three thous -and dollard from the auxiliary to Borden Ross, president of the Branch, from the auxiliary.
