CANADIAN CANCER SOCIETY

Cancer research is costly. An electron microscope runs from \$50,000 to \$95,000. An ultra-centrifuge with rotors is \$20,000 while a head/body scanner costs between \$200,000 and \$700,000, according to Fred Sgambati, Campaign Chairman of the Canadian Cancer Society.

"Research, funded through public contributions to the Society also requires new buildings to house research centres. Salaries have to be paid to full-time scientists, laboratory technicians and assistants. Material and equipment must be purchased," said Mr. Sgambati, well-known C.B.C. sportscaster.

"April is campaign month for the Canadian Cancer Society. Without the generous donations of the Canadian public, our support of cancer research would not be possible. Nor would the Society be able to continue its program of public education and service to cancer patients," he continued.

The entire emphasis of the 1978 fund-raising and education campaign is on action: the action of protecting oneself against cancer; the action of protecting others through support of cancer research.

"Each dollar given to the Canadian Cancer Society goes to work in three ways", said the Campaign Chairman. "The first part of the program -- support of research -- is well known.

"The second, education, is approached from the public and professional standpoint. Throughout Canada the Society carries out public education on the importance of early detection of cancer, when prompt treatment could result in a cure. Cancer prevention is also stressed. Attention to early symptoms by men and women can affect great savings in human suffering and reduction in extensive medical costs. Society films, publications and conferences bring cancer news and facts to the medical and allied professions.
