from HISTORY'S SCRAPBOOK DATES AND EVENTS FROM YESTERYEARS

February 9, 1950 — A charge that the State Department is infested with Communists is made by Senator Joseph R. McCarthy (R., Wis.) during a speech before a Republican Women's Club in West Virginia.

February 10, 1962 — Francis Gary Powers, held by Russia as an American spy, is released in exchange for Soviet spy Rudolf Abel.

February 11, 1961 — In Washington, Robert C. Weaver is sworn in as an administrator of the U.S. Housing and Home Finance Agency, the highest federal post ever held to date by a Negro.

February 12, 1809 — Birthday of Abraham Lincoln, 16th President of the United States.

February 13, 1635 — The Boston Latin School, the oldest public school in America, is established in Boston, Massachusetts.

February 14, 1859 — Oregon is admitted as the Union's 33rd state.

February 15, 1879 — President Rutherford B. Hayes signs into law a bill admitting women to practice law before the U.S. Supreme Court.
