

Industry criticizes land use plans

The goals and strategies outlined by the Science Council of Canada in a recent report entitled "Canada's Threatened Forest" are in line with those expounded by Ontario's forest industry, says the president of the Ontario Forest Industries Association.

Speaking to a luncheon meeting of the Port Arthur Rotary Club here today, Kenneth D. Greaves of Toronto said the Council's rationale for the increase in the

productive potential of the forest is supported by the estimate that world demand for forest products will double over the next 40 years.

"With increased levels of forest protection and more intensive forest management, the size of the economic sector could be doubled to \$44-billion," he stated.

He added that there could be parallel increases in the net positive trade balance to \$24-billion and net

revenues to all governments amounting to \$6-billion.

Currently, the gross value of Canada's forest products is \$23-billion annually with a net positive annual trade balance of \$12-billion.

The industry employs directly or indirectly one out of every 10 working Canadians.

In taking note of the Economic Council's title for its report, Mr. Greaves said, the only real threat "lies in continued inaction on the part of the two senior levels of governments."

Mr. Greaves also called for complete "dedication to the protection of the forest from fire, insects and disease."

He said the disastrous fires of 1980 must never

be repeated, and he noted there was industry satisfaction with Ontario's acquisition of two CL-215 water bombers.

He said it was "a start in the right direction" but hardly close to the 1981 OFIA brief which called for purchase of 15-20 modern CL-125 heavy water bombers to

replace Ontario's aging fire protection fleet.

Mr. Greaves also called for prevention of "Further alienation of non-productive purposes from an extremely limited productive land base" and again criticized the Ontario government's strategic land use planning pro-

cess. He also noted that Canada can only maintain her competitive position in world mar-

ets "if we improve our productivity in our manufacturing facilities and lower the unit costs of production."
