

continued from page 3 icipalities in Ontario would help us." The Council voted to contribute \$500 to the relief fund.

The Kinsmen Club requested the Council's permission ot block off part of Lakeview Drive and use it for their Soapbox Derby on July 1. The Council granted the Club its routine approval.

Under New Business the Council held a tense debate on the Zoning by-law and how it affects the Aquasabon Falls Trailer Park (see accompaning story). The Council also passed a by-law authorizing parking for handicapped persons at the Recreation Centre. Reeve Speer said, "Tom Tack has been kind enough to work this out for us."

**Under Other Business** the Council agreed to re-name the municipal offices the W.J. Hanley Building and secure an appropriate plaque, and to install 170 feet of chainlink fence on the Town's property at the rear of the Shell Service Station. **NEW CLERK**
