proximately two (2) hours. The public can also expect some traffic disruptions in the immediate vicinity of the Recreation Complex.

The purpose of this "Mock Disaster" is to identify problems with present written Disaster Plans so that they can be rectified and better prepare all agencies to cope with a real disaster should one unfortunately occur.
