

#### Bernier announces more

### funding for the North

Leo Bernier, Minister of Northern Affairs recently announced the ministry's spending estimates for 1983-84 which have been fixed at \$158,488,400.00 for the fiscal year.

In his introduction to the estimate, Bernier noted that his ministry was devoting more time and money to local economic development and programmes aimed at community enhancement. "I think it's fair to say that we are moving away from things that had to be done, to things that ought to be done,' said Bernier. "We are looking now at more programmes of a social or even a cultural nature, in addition to the provision of such basic services as sewer and water facilities, or industrial servicing." These basic services will still command the lion's share of the ministry's budget because they provide the infrastructture necessary for economic development to take place.

As examples of programmes, the ministry had undertaken recently in the social or cultural areas, he cited

the recent announcements that the ministry would provide assistance for extended care additions to hospitals in Atikokan, Geraldton, Dryden, Smooth Rock Falls and Sioux Look-

The Minister also noted the TVOntario extension programme. Approximately 50 northern communities are receiving TVO by satellite and a total of 170 will be on stream by the time the programme is completed which is probably next year. Under this programme, the ministry provides antennas and low power rebroadcasting equipment to communities free of charge to enable them to receive TVO off air via Canada's Anik C satel-

Bernier emphasized throughout his remarks that all programmes funded by his ministry contributed to economic development, whether directly or indirectly. "Community development and economic development go hand in hand. Health care initiatives such as air ambulance or our medical/dental centres


serve to buttress our more concerted efforts with municipalities in the area of local economic development" Bernier remarked.

Among these efforts, the minister singled out the recently announced Northern Community Economic Development Programme. To date, \$249,000 has been committed to seven communities for this programme. Funds are provided for opportunity studies, industrial development and community economic profile publications.

Describing the unique mandate given the ministry to represent the north in the formulation of all government policies and programmes affecting it, Bernier noted that his ministry has really a prototype in the province. "Not all such experiments succeed. This one truly has succeeded and the Ministry of Northern Affairs has proven to be a most successful vehicle for addressing the unique needs of Northern Ontario," he said.
