With no body checking allowed, Ringette displays a quickness and versatility not common to all team sports. As a result, thousands of females, and some males, have enjoyed their participa-

tion. Why Ringette?

There are many reasons why youngsters become involved in Ringette. The code of the game is quite simple and reflects one of the most important characteristics of the sport: consideration of the child.

Ringette: Code of the Game:

1) To ensure the healthy well-being of every person involved in the sport.

2) To ensure mass participation and the opportunity for all to play in a fun atmosphere.

3) To maintain the principle of no intentional body contact.

4) To give the players an option of recreational or high level tournament play.

5) To maintain a high standard of safety while retaining a low cost of participation.

6) To foster the development of players, coaches and officials.

7) To maintain player input into the administration of the sport.

8) To ensure the promotion of goodwill and friendship.

Basic Principles for Sport

All sports should be concerned about several basic principles in order to meet the needs of participants. These

· offering a choice of levels of play to suit all participants;

· encouraging cooperation and teamwork among players;

· emphasis on skill development in the early stages;

· promotion of fair play in a fun atmosphere;

• opportunity to learn self-discipline, organization and responsibility;

ensuring a high standard of safety;

· achieving a balance between the values of winning and losing;

· keeping the game interesting and exciting. Several reasons why children dislike sports are: lack of participation; susceptibility to injury; dislike for losing and no choice of position.

To be successful as a sport, organizers must consider these principles and need committees to look at improve-

ments in the game to meet participants' needs more closely. Parent education programmes are needed to explain the game and its principles in programmes (eg. coaching and officiating clinics, player schools), must promote the sport's philosophy so

ing the needs of the child that we can continue to see increased involvement in sport for the benefit of the participant and a decreased dropout rate.

In Ringette, the above principles are constantly being reviewed to improve the game for the participants. It is hoped that other sports will also take on this basic responsibility.
