

Community Auditorium thanks Terrace Bay

The communities of Northwestern Ontario have been supportive of the efforts to build a new Regional Centre for the performing arts for many years. After more than a decade of struggle and hope, the Thunder Bay Community Auditorium Project, a 1,500-seat Arts Centre, is finally under construction with a projected opening date of October 1985. The new facility is being built on Nor'Westers Park, adjacent to the Canada Games Complex in Thunder Bay.

Recently, the Auditorium Committee had the opportunity to acknowledge the support of the people and communities of Northwestern Ontario. At a press conference held in Thunder Bay, Taras Kozyra, Chairman of the Auditorium Fund raising campaign recognized the contributions of these communities and in particular, the donation of \$1,000 from the township of Terrace Bay.

Reeve David Speer, who represented the township of Terrace Bay

at the press conference, commented on the significance of this project to his community and all of Northwestern Ontario. Taras Kozyra thanked Reeve Speer and the people of Terrace Bay for helping to build the Community Auditorium - an important new resource for our region.

Mr. Kozyra also noted that many individuals from across Northwestern Ontario have personally supported the project with their gifts and endowments.

Schreiber Council Report

The regular monthly meeting of the Schreiber Municipal Council was held in Chambers on December 13th. The meeting was called to order by Reeve Fischer. Councillor Cosgrove was unable to attend. Minutes from the previous meeting were adopted as read.

Business Arising out of Minutes:

Various problems and conditions that have arisen, concerning the development of land by Figliomeni Bros. at Walker Lake Road, have been given to the township solicitor, who will communicate directly with Figliomeni Bros. legal advisors. Figliomeni Brothers have also indicated that they would like to meet with members of Council regarding their land developments.

Committee Reports

Roads: The Roads Committee has made a suggestion that a yearly budget of \$10,000 and possibly a reserve fund of \$2,000 per year be set up to repair sidewalks in the township. Those sidewalks now in a bad state of repair would be dealt with first. Possibly some work could be done under the Federal/Provincial make-work projects. If the Ministry of Transportation and Communications sees fit to grant monies for 1984, the 1984 budget will include some paving, especially on Bayview, Winnipeg and other small areas.

ship of Schreiber purchase a Scott 11A Pressure Pack, for use at the plant.

Details of the R-271 and 270 Engineering study, have been presented to Council by Wardrope Associates. It was noted that a meeting should be arranged in the future to obtain clear title to lot 124.

Bi-Centennial Committee: J. Handle was on hand to request that Council consider establishing an area from Scotia St.-Winnipeg St. to Scotia-Subway; for street dances as part of the 1984 Bi-Centennial celebrations. Council took the matter under advisement. The event would be held in June or July of 1984.

Water and Sewer: The contract at the treatment plant has almost completed the work scheduled for this season. The job will be shut down during the winter months, and it is expected that work will resume in March-April 1984.

A report on the projected water and sewer operating costs and budget for 1984, was presented to Council. After some discussion it was resolved that water rates for the year 1984 be increased 17.5 per cent and sewer service rates for 1984 be increased by 23.5 per cent.

P. Doig requested that the road to the sludge dumping pit be kept open during the winter months to allow for sludge dumping.

Building Committee: The Clerk was requested to write CP Rail concerning the necessity of the railway to take out building permits, regardless of the fact that a blanket permit has been granted to the

railway for minor repairs. CP Rail also to be requested to obtain a permit for renovations to the car barns.

Fire: Reeve Fischer thanked P. Doig the Fire Chief for the volunteer work done by the Fire Dept. to raise money for the new fire hall. A donation of \$25,000 was made to the Fire Hall Reserve Fund by the Dept. The Fire Dept. Advisory Board has requested that the Property Committee meet with them as soon as possible.

Recreation: The Rec Committee requested that Council co-operate in the staging of a Christmas Tree Bonfire which is to be held on January 14th. Council agreed to arrange to have the works crew pick up discarded trees on Jan. 12-13th.

The formal agreements, between the various schools and the Parks and Recreation Committee regarding the exchange of recreational facilities, will be presented to the schools and council for signature soon.

Council resolved that Shannon Riley be hired as a part-time maintenance person, effective on Dec. 14th.

Police: The new radar unit has been delivered to the O.P.P. for their use.

Welfare: E. Borutski presented a report on a recent meeting of the joint committee on Battered Women held in Marathon. A tentative budget of \$204,000 has been established for the operation of a shelter, the cost of which will be shared on a 80%-20% basis with the Province of Ontario. The Township of Marathon, has offered institutional land

in a planned new subdivision for a location for the shelter.

Economic Development Committee: A Small Business Seminar is planned for Jan. 26th, similar to the one held in November. The Clerk was requested to obtain a price on suitable letter head for use by the E.C.D. Committee.

L. Dunwoody reported on the promotional presentation prepared by the McCausland Hospital Board, for use while promoting physicians for the area. This presentation could also be used by various groups interested in promoting Schreiber and Terrace Bay and spare slides were also given to the Committee by the Board for possible use in promotional material.

Communications and Disposal of Same:

An offer to grant a long term lease was received from Ontario Hydro. Council reviewed the terms of the lease and felt that the monetary conditions were too small. The Clerk was instructed to return the offer to Ontario Hydro for their further consideration and possibly to re-submit to the township a revised bid.

CP Rail advised that no land close to the present Town Hall could be made available to the township for use as a Fire Hall in the foreseeable future.

Notice of a meeting to be held in Marathon on Jan. 5th concerning the presentation of the Hemlo Impact Study was received by Council. Council agreed that they would support such a time and place if all other Councils are in agreement.
