For safety and savings, keep tire pressure up

Under-inflated tires can cost you a small fortune. They could also cost you your life. Surveys show that most car owners keep their tires at a lower pressure than recommended by car and tire manufacturers. A Shell Canada spot check of 250 cars showed that the most common problem, which occurred in almost half the cars checked, was under-inflated tires.

Running a car with tire pressures lower than recommended is not only potentially dangerous but is also costly. Underinflated tires take more power to make them roll. This increased rolling resistance significantly increases gasoline consumption. If tire pressures are only 10 percent below the recommended level, then the gasoline bill will increase by two percent. If pressures are allowed to be as much as 20 percent too low, and they often are, then the gasoline bill will increase by five percent. Under-inflated tires also wear out more quickly. A tire that's underinflated can lose onefifth of its useful life.

On the other hand, if tire pressures are too high, although there will be slightly beneficial effect on the gasoline bill.

it will be at the expense of road grip and safety. With over-inflated tires, a car's handling characteristics may change completely. For long journeys on fast roads, tire pressures can be increased slightly. The correct amount of the increase is shown in your car owner's handbook. But again, do not overinflate tires as it could adversely affect handling and be dangerous.

The type of tire on your car affects fuel economy. When the time comes to buy tires, consider radials. Radial tires give better gasoline economy than bias-ply tires because they offer less rolling resistance. Radials will reduce fuel consumption by 3.5-6 per cent. In addition, bias-ply tires will wear more quickly and need to be replaced after approximately 40,000 km as compared with the expected 60-70,000 km life of a radial tire.

For those who have radials, the "radial bulge" can disguise a tire that is under-inflated. Use a good quality tire pressure guage to check your radials. Check all tire pressures at least once a month at your service station. It costs nothing, it saves money, and it may save your life.

And there's times when it is dark out With my nightcap on my head, I don't know if I'm retiring Or just getting out of bed.


So, if it's my turn to write to you There's no need in getting sore. I may think that I have written And don't want to be a bore.
