Township of Manitowadge reports on MANITOUWADGE—Hemlo update

Well, winter has finally set in, people are skiing, curling, snowshoeing, spending considerable time enjoying all the aspects of winter. The Council of the Township of Manitowadge would like to take this opportunity to wish you and yours all the best in 1984. Although things have been relatively quiet, the Township has been busy preparing for the summer of 1984.

Residential Housing

In late December the town Council met with their engineers, Marshall-Macklin Monaghan, at that time preliminary plans for some one thousand lots were presented, these were pared down to four hundred potential for 1984. Noranda Mines (Hemlo) has since announced that they will construct between one hundred and thirty and one hundred and fifty houses in Manitowadge in 1984. This construction, coupled with construction by private developers will certainly put construction well over the two hundred mark for 1984. At this point a thirty

apartment complex for single employees will be constructed by Noranda Mines.

Industrial

Just recently Algoma Electrical Distributors Ltd., opened their doors for business. They can be found on Black Road (826-3281). The township also welcomes Pierman Construction to the community. This company recently purchased property in the industrial area. A number of other companies are in the process of purchasing land in the industrial area, as details are finalized, company names, etc., will be released in future updates.

Commercial Area

As mentioned in past updates, the township of Manitowadge has endorsed the concept of a downtown Mall. Harkmark Hotels Ltd. of Toronto has been commissioned to do a feasibility study in this regard. The study is to be released by mid-March. In the meantime a goodly number of out of town retail business in Manitowadge. As details of the Mall concept are available for release we

Bicentennial medals to honour Ontarians

Nearly 2,000 Ontarians will be honoured for voluntary service to their communities and province through the award of 1,984 Bicentennial medals this year.

The decision concerning who will receive the medals will be made by municipal and Indian Band councils across Ontario over the next few months. Every community will be invited to participate.

The programme is designed to recognize community service work and voluntarism and is one of the major undertakings by the province to celebrate the Bicentennial anniversary.

1984 is a significant date in the history of this province and it is appropriate that during the year we recognize citizens who have given of themselves to the betterment of our communities and our province.

Nominations for medals will be invited from Ontario communities defined as municipalities, unincorporated communities in Northern Ontario served by local service boards and Indian Bands on the following basis: - all of these will be entitled to nominate one individual to receive the Bicentennial medal; however

200,000 can nominate 12 additional persons;

b) municipalities with populations exceeding 100,000 can nominate 10 additional persons;

c) municipalities with populations between 20,000 and 100,000 can nominate 6 additional persons;

d) municipalities with populations between 10,000 and 20,000 can nominate 4 additional persons;

e) municipalities with populations between 5,000 and 10,000 can nominate two additional persons.

Elected officials are not eligible for nomination.

Nominations will be made through a resolution passed in council and submitted to a Bicentennial Awards Committee chaired by Margaret Birch, Parliamentary Assistant to the Premier and Chairman of the Cabinet Committee on the Bicentennial. Submissions close on June 30, 1984.

Individuals and voluntary organizations will also have an opportunity to nominate people who are considered worthy of recognition by submitting names and profiles to the awards committee. Up to 200 medals will be awarded to people selected by the

awards committee on the basis of the submissions. Details on how to make submissions will be published in local newspapers.

"Voluntarism has been enormously significant to the quality of life we enjoy in this province," Mrs. Birch said. "Community volunteers are the bedrock of our society and I am personally delighted that all of us across Ontario have this opportunity to recognize the tremendous contributions these individuals are making."
