## Committee to advise on health services

Advising the Health Ministry on the recruitment of professionals to work in the province's underserved areas, and liaison with local district health councils, will be major functions of the Underserved Area Advisory Committee, named recently by Health Minister Keith Norton.

Committee members are: Rene Brunelle of Moon Beam, former Mpp and Minister of Natural Resources; Helen Kelleher, Soult Ste. Marie; Dr. Hough Allen, Sioux Lookout; and Graham Pope, Timmins.

The programme which was started in 1969, now has more than 380 doctors and 94 dentists participating. It offers financial incentives to encourage health professionals to establish or join practices in the underserved areas. It has also established nursing stations in communities which are isolated or have small populations, as well as dental clinics and a mobile dental coach programme.
