## Seat belts recommended

### Re Government Training Program:

Inquest Recommendation: A government sponsored Driver Training Program should be offered to all prospective school bus drivers as part of the requirement for a Class B licence." Sub-committee recommendation; "That the Board support this recommendation."

### Re First Aid Course:

Inquest recommendation: "All school bus drivers must complete a certified first aid course." Sub-committee recommendation: "That the Board support this recommendation as strongly as possible. That the Board consider making this a requirement in their contractual arrangements with their carriers."

### Re Tape Players:

Inquest recommendation: "Any tape player to be used in a school bus must be securely fastened and tapes stored in a secure man-

ner." Sub-committee recommendation; "That the Board support this recommendation. That the Board insist its operators locate such units so as to be operated by a designated student and not by the driver."

### Re Interior Design:

Inquest recommendation: "An immediate extensive study on interior design structure be completed by Transport Canada with particular emphasis on Emergency Exits. Priority should be given to reinforcing exit frames." Sub-committee recommendation; "That the Board support this recommendation and particularly endorse the emphasis on emergency exits."

### Re Education Program for Passengers:

Inquest recommendation: "A programme must be implemented by all school boards to instruct all school bus passengers as to emergency exits and evacuation." continued on page 11
