The Canada Employment Centre for Students has reopened once again this summer, under the direction of Veronica Leybourne, Student Placement Officer for the Terrace Bay/Schreiber area.

Veronica's job as Placement Officer entails such duties as: being a liaision between the employer and the student; promoting student employment to prospective client businesses; to help students in job search techniques by educating them on such aspects as personal appearance and self presentations for the initial job interview; and also by informing them on various government programmes which include Summer Canada Works, Experience '84, the Ontario Youth Employment Programme, the Student Venture Capital Programme, as well as many others.

"I pound the pavement and try to convince employers to hire a student. Employers don't stop to consider the various types of work that could employ students, and this ranges from dog walking to babysitting and from taking inventory to cleaning windows. My services are free to the employers and by hiring a summer student, the employer will not only save valuable dollars, but will also provide employment for our local

youth." Veronica provides free job exposure for businesses and can save the employer valuable time by screening the students beforehand and sending you only qualified prospects. She can also offer a place for the employer to conduct his/her interview within the Employment Centre and she will at that time, inform them of the various student programs.

Statistics from 1983 show that 156 students registered for employment with 112 positions available. Over 50 per cent of the vacancies were filled by the help of

the Student Employment Centre.

This year again, the programme is being well utilized, with already over 20 students registered. The average age of the registrants is 16 to 17 years for females; and aged 17 years, for males.

Ongoing in the area this year are four Summer Canada Works Programmes that are designed to create meaningful work for students by financing socially useful programmes. In Terrace Bay are two of these; one within the McCausland Hospital, the other through the Rec Centre that involves playground work and landscaping.

Pays Plat has hired three native students under this system, to paint the interior and exterior of the community hall, and Schreiber (under the "Schreiber Greens Programme") will hire three labourers and one manager, to assist in clearing the White Sand Beach area, to cut logs for play-ground equipment, to construct a backstop and carry out field maintenance at the high school, and to erect two new fitness stations.

If you are in need of a student for your business, or if you're an individual in need of someone to cut your

grass, weed your garden, babysit, or clean windows, then you're a potential employer.

The Centre is open Monday to Friday from 1 to 5 p.m. and Veronica invites students and employers to drop by and talk with her about job placements.


