"How can you stand to live in a small town - nothing ever happens!" these words were from a friend who knew me when my bread-and-butter was earned in Winnipeg. To a certain extent I imagine I did assume the role of a city dweller because conformity, strangely enough, gives a fair percentage of privacy.

However, conformity implies studied acquiescence. What we saw in Terrace Bay in the last few weeks was not conformity, but inspiration. When the citizens turned out to inaugurate our 25th anniversary

week, did they come to the arena out of curiosity? Did they bring their children because they couldn't find a babysitter? Did they go for a walk because it was a pleasant evening, weather-wise? Who knows? But they came, walked our clean, well-groomed streets, and welcomed people from so far away that most of us probably never heard of their city. The motivation was pride ... pride in a small town, pride in a community with so many

differences that they can be shrugged off when outside criticism threatens to divide. Sure, the old-timers were there, those who had seen the transition from mill town to constitutional municipality, but the excitement lay in the numbers of new citizens, with their children, who have elected to make a life for their families up here in a "small town."
