Terrace Bay Council Report

The Terrace Bay Town Council met on Monday, July 16. Present were Ollie Chapman, Joe Kennedy, George Ramsay and Bill Houston, who in the absence of the Reeve, chaired the meeting.

Mr. E. Paget, Mr. T. Korzinski, Mr. R. Churchley and Mrs. I. Paget appeared before Council to advise of their plans to develop lots 7, 8 and 9 on Simcoe Plaza. They will be building larger quarters for a Jewellery Store, Radio Shack and a Law Office. This advance notice will help the Township to prepare for utility connections, sidewalks, tree removal, etc. They will make application for a building permit at a later date.

The Curling Club lease was discussed and the rental fee was set at \$6,000, an increase of less than 4 per cent.

Mr. S. Chalmers of Kimberly Clark and representatives of the Aquasabon Golf Club came to the council meeting to discuss the possibility of the municipality assuming the ownership of the golf course. Mr. Chalmers was disappointed that Council was ill-prepared

for the discussion but received assurance that the matter would be discussed in committee and another meeting called.

Rod and Randy Mercure sought a solution to the problem of obtaining the use of a gravel pit. Because of a mapping discrepancy with Ministry of Natural Resources maps and the proximity of a sewage tailings dump site, the Mercures must move 100 feet to a different area which must be rezoned. The rezoning process with notices and hearings takes 65 days minimum and during that time the land must not be used for gravel purposes even though they have a license to cut trees as well as a gravel permit issued by the Ministry of Natural Resources. Council offered to seek a short term source of gravel for the contractors. (This was accomplished the next day with the co-operation of the Township of Schreiber and the Ministry of Natural Resources.)

New Business and Correspondence were handled through resolutions as follows. The Clerk Co-ordinator and members of Council

wishing to do so were authorized to attend the Northwestern Ontario Planning Conference in Kenora, September 13 and 14 at the expense of the municipality.

Council is requesting the Ministry of Transportation and Communication to carry out the painting of centre lines and crosswalks.

Reimbursement of police training costs to Constable R. Phillips was approved.

The R. Corazza Limited tender for replacement and construction of curbing was accepted in the amount of \$26,762.35. It was the lowest tender and the company's previous work for the Township has been satisfactory.

The Statement of Disbursements for the Township in the amount of \$704,726.05 was discussed and approved.

The Hydro Statement of Disbursements was approved in the amount of \$69,501.53.

The municipality was authorized to enter into an agreement regarding the purchase and sale of aviation fuel at the Terrace Bay Airport.

Councillor Champan reported that \$12,185

was returned to the Township from various fund raising activities during the 25th Anniversary. This will help lessen the amount which the Township must pay for the celebration.

The cemetery plaque has been ordered and delivery is expected at the end of August.

Councillor Ramsay reported that Police business had been routine with no accidents or fatalities.

Two hundred applications were submitted for the position of police constable for the Township. Eight people were interviewed and the decision will be announced soon.

Councillor Kennedy reported that the Senior Citizens' party was highly successful and incurred minimal costs.

The access road to the airport runway was dug out but apparently 4-wheel drive vehicles are still able to drive over it, therefore it must be dug out again. Also, there is one crack in the runway.

Councillor Houston, reporting on the fact that a recent audit showed a surplus of funds advised that the reason for the increase in the Hydro revenues

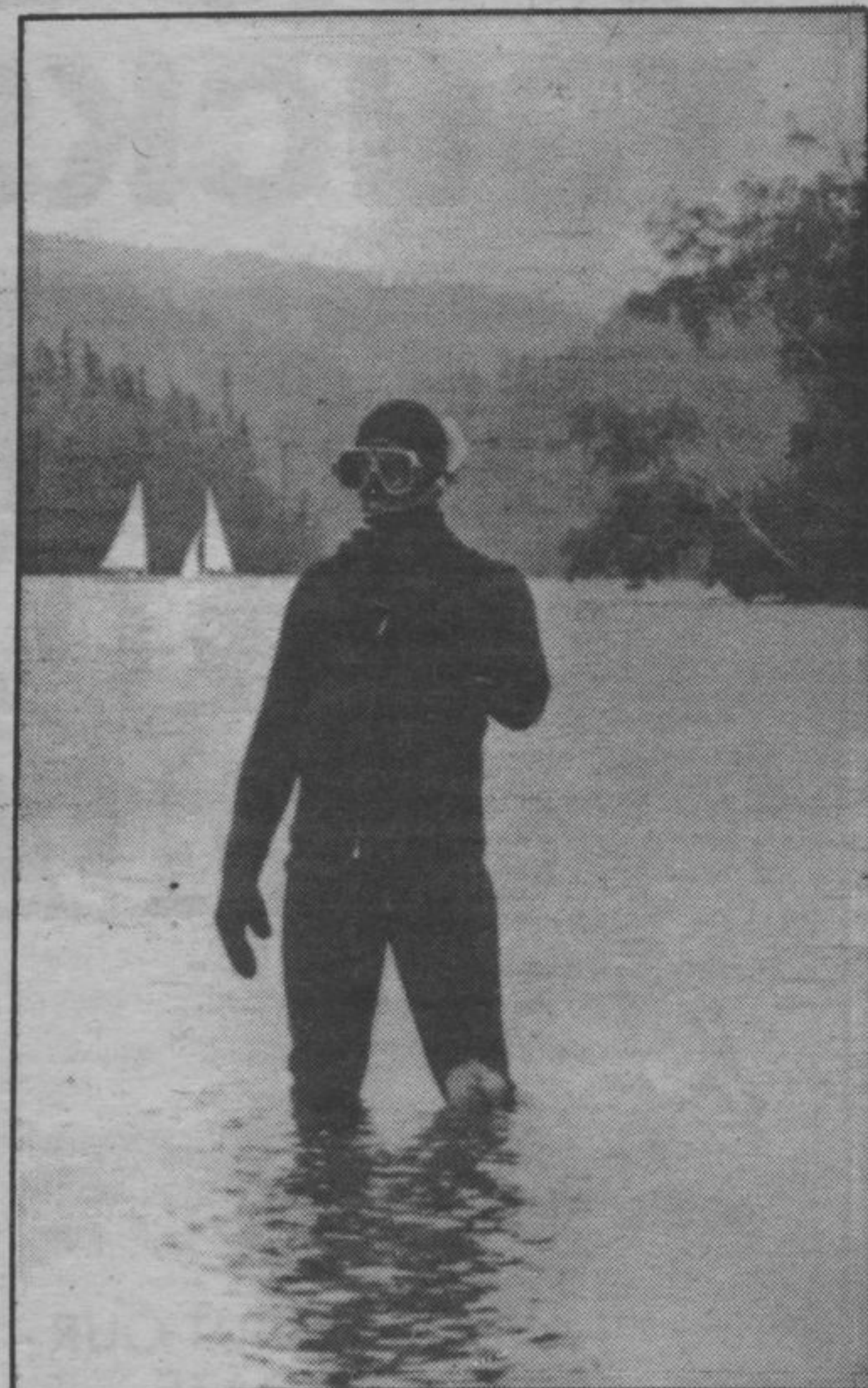
was the fact that Terrace Bay had experienced a harsh winter not a precipitous rise in rates. He was concerned about the fact that \$68,000 was budgeted for Capital work and only \$4,000 has been spent. If the work is not done this year, there could be a shortage of power in the industrial area. In the hopes of convincing Hydro that the work is a priority, Bill will travel to Thunder Bay to meet with Hydro Officials.

It was decided by Council that a committee will be formed to look into the feasibility of developing the Aquasabon Gorge and waterfront area.

There was a suggestion that the Police Station could be moved to the space to be vacated on Simcoe Plaza.

A request for a "no parking" zone at the top of Kenogami was made, as a solution to lessen the danger now present when cars park on that corner.

The Council Meeting was adjourned following a round of applause for Councillor Ollie Chapman's efforts as chairman of the 25th Anniversary Committee.
