Students: Venture into the business world

"Closed Tuesdays... gone sailing" is an interesting way to make money. According to John Kelley and Bradley Ball it's the most effective way. John and Bradley are operating Surf, Wind and Sail, a boardsail business in Thunder Bay.

"Our business is run by boardsailors for boardsailors" says Bradley a 23 year old Bachelor of Commerce student at University of Manitoba.

John also 23 and a Bachelor of Commerce student at Lakehead University adds "We are gaining practical experience developing managerial skills. That's a taste of business a

textbook can't deliver." According to John and Bradley, the benefits of running your own business are immense. "We buy our equipment at cost, learn valuable business techniques as well as have lots of fun. Best of all we are confident we are going to be here for a few more years."

Their business is in its second summer of operation with assistance from the Student Venture Capital program.

The Student Venture Capital program provides an opportunity for students to borrow up to \$2,000 interest-free to plan and operate their own summer business. The program is designed to encourage entrepreneurial activity and to teach young people practical small business concepts.

Young people apply through their local Chamber of Commerce who interview them to determine the feasibility of the business. Upon the Chamber of Commerce's recommendation, the Ontario Youth Secretariat approves the application and the Royal Bank issues the loan.

To be eligible for the Student Venture Capital program, the young person must be at least 15 years old, returning to school in the fall and be a Canadian citizen.

According to Melissa Felteau, Summer Information Officer for the Ontario Youth Secretariat, more young people in Northwestern Ontario should get involved in this program. "It is a fantastic opportunity for young people to gain valuable marketable skills, earn some money and likely experience the most exciting summer of their

This summer up to 2 million dollars was available to accommodate 1100 businesses across Ontario. Unfortunately only twelve Student Venture Capital businesses are operating between Sault Ste. Marie and Kenora. These include: Eagle Audio in Vermilion Bay, Birdhouse Enterprises in Fort Frances, Andrew

Clark Painting, Len Doherty Logging, Surf, Wind and Sail, all in Thunder Bay and seven other Student Venture Capital businesses in Sault Ste. Marie. "Young people in Student Venture Capital businesses could benefit from this program," says Felteau.

More information and applications are available at Canada Employment Centres for Students, high school guidance offices, college or university student placement centres, participating Chamber of Commerce, Royal Bank branches, local offices of Members of Provincial Parliament and the Ontario Youth Secretariat (call collect 416-965-0546). The loan is interest-free from April 2 to October 1 and the application deadline is June 15.

To address youth unemployment, over the next three years the provincial government will spend \$450 million on new Ontario Youth Opportunities. As part of this program a revised Venture Capital program will be starting this fall. Up to a \$5,000 interest-free loan will be available for out-ofschool youths to start year-round businesses.
