

Resigns

At the October 22 meeting of Terrace Bay Town Council, a letter from Councillor Joe Kennedy was read. The letter stated that Mr. Kennedy was resigning his seat on council on the advice of his physician. Council accepted the resignation with regret.

At a special committee meeting held after the regular council meeting it was decided that the runner-up in the last municipal election would fill the vacant seat. Mr. Peter Romanuk has served as a town councillor previously.

Other business at the council meeting included Reeve Dave Speer's report on his presentation to Provincial Council of Cabinet in Toronto which was arranged by N.O.M.A. He said there were no answers yet but he did find some sympathy from the ministers present.

Councillor Ollie Chapman, who also atdistended, was appointed in the meeting. According to Councilior Chapman, ten ministers were present at the meeting and all but three had gotten up and left before Reeve Speer's presentation. Minister Education Bette Stephenson did not come at all.

The Horticultural Society requested Council to take action to prevent wasteful cutting of trees on public land within the Township. Trees cut behind Lakeview could cause erosion problems.

Since Kimberly-Clark has the authority to grant permission to cut trees on their land, Council will discuss with them the possibility of establishing some kind of control agreement regarding tree cutting.

Councillor Chapman suggested that Terrace Bay should have a "poop and scoop" bylaw. The resolution passed called for the investigation for possible implementation of "a by-law to require dog owners to collect and dispose of their animal's waste when deposited on public property."

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, Community Planning Advisory Branch replied to council's inquiry on the establishment of Site Plan Control under the terms of the township's official plan. Council agreed to pursue the first option set out in the letter, that being to establish a bylaw under Section 40 of the Planning Act. The by-law would require a developer to submit their building plans for approval by the Township.

If the budget is accepted, the Province will provide 80 per cent of operating costs and 20 per cent will be funded by Marathon, Manitouwadge, Terrace Bay, Schreiber, Rossport, Pays Plat, Heron Bay and Mobert.

The curling club is in need of a dehumidifier. It was suggested that the Township and the Curling Club share the costs, provided a written request is received by Council prior to October 31.

The Canadian Railway Labour Association requested council to petition the federal authorities to hold their hearings in connection with the testing of cabooseless trains in more convenient locations across Canada, and not just at Hull, Quebec. A resolution to that effect was passed.

The Township of Downie requested support for a resolution asking the Province to remove the Ring-Billed Gull from the list of protected species. Council requested further information before proceeding with this matter.

A taxi licence to operate in Terrace Bay was granted to North Shore Cab Co. of Schreiber.

The North of Superior Tourism Association requested a donation of \$1,000 towards the cost of producing a new North of Superior Discovery Guide. Council is interested in participating but funds for this purpose are not available before next year.

Mrs. Brenda Harper of the police staff was authorized to attend the C.P.I.C. operator's training course in Aylmer in November. The Building Inspector and the Plumbing Inspector were authorized to attend the "Building Together" seminar on Residential Renovation and the Plumbing Code to be held in Thunder Bay in November.
