A new out-patient program for Thunder Bay-area residents with alcohol or drug problems and a new mental health rehabilitation program have received ministry approval and financial support, Health Minister Keith Norton announced today. Both programs were endorsed as high priorities by the Thunder Bay District Health Council.

St. Joseph's Hospital, Thunder Bay, will open an out-patient program at the Smith Clinic. The new program will provide counselling, therapy, lectures and assessment for the alcoholic or drug abuser and for that person's family. Those 18 and older will be referred to the new program from the Smith Clinic in-patient service and from industry, the courts, Alcholics Anonymous, social services, churches and other community programs.

The ministry will provide a one-time capital grant of \$3,000 and annual funding of \$150,980.

Dick O'Donnell, chairman of the Thunder Bay District Health Council, said, "The new Smith

Clinic out-patient chemical dependency program will fill an important gap in community services for residents of the Thunder Bay area."

Carole Faulkner, chairman of the council's mental health committee, said, "The new program recognizes the importance of out-patient services in the treatment of alcholism and drug dependency."

The Thunder Bay branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association will operate the new rehabilitation action program to start, in Thunder Bay, later this year. The ministry will provide a one-time capital grant of \$6,500 and annual funding will be \$51,750.

"The program will offer community-based services for those with mental health problems who are experiencing difficulty coping with daily living," said Mr. Norton. "An individual will learn to become more self-reliant, to gain or regain selfconfidence and selfesteem, and to develop life skills necessary for independent living within the


