
Election over, Pouliot in

The election is over, we have a new MPP, Mr. Gilles Pouliot of the New Democratic Party. Polls closed promptly at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, May 2nd and the final race was on.


Terrace Bay's Jim Files, a Progressive Conservative did very well in his home town and surrounding area, beating Gilles Pouliot in

both Terrace Bay and Schreiber. Terrace Bay polls were Jim Files 575, Gilles Pouliot 397 and Michael Power 261. In Schreiber, Files 452, Pouliot 404 and Power 179. Pouliot recovered in Manitouwadge taking 920 votes to Files 236 and Powers 193. It was a close race in Marathon, Pouliot

winning with 377, Power 359, and Files 355. Files took Nipigon with 500 votes, beating Pouliot's 465 and Powers' 243, he also took Heron Bay with 43 votes, Power with 33 and Pouliot with 20. Figures available to the NEWS at 10:00 p.m. showed Pouliot in the lead with 4,800 votes.

Contract awarded for Highway 17

Ontario Transportation Communications Minister George McCague and Northern Affairs Minister Leo Bernier have announced the award of a contract for Highway 17 in Thunder Bay district.

The contract is for resurfacing, grading, drainage,

granular base, hot mix paving, hot mix patching and structure rehabilitation on Highway 17, from 15.4 km east of Nipigon easterly for 44.7 km including two passing lanes and work in Rossport.

This resurfacing and structure rehabilitation pro-

ject on Highway 17 is undertaken to restore and widen the pavement, improve driving conditions by the addition of passing lanes, rehabilitate the Gravel River Bridge and reduce the maintenance requirements through the area.

Work on the project is scheduled to begin in May, 1985 with completion set for early fall, 1985.

The contract is awarded to Bruno's Contracting (Thunder Bay) Limited of Thunder Bay, Ontario at a cost of \$2.018,644.
