


This week in fire

Prescribed burns, as mentioned in a previous article, are the deliberate application of fire to meet forest objectives.

A burn of this nature was undertaken on June 30th in the Manitouwadge area. A thermal column

7000 feet high was visible for many miles. This exercise met with the Ministry's objectives of preparing a logged area for reforestation. The fire was contained within the specified boundaries by a pre-bulldozed line. Fire line crews were assigned


positions in the event of a continuation of the fire to undesirable areas and were augmented with helicopter surveillance, twin otters and two canso water bombers.

The successful endeavour will be followed up with a second burn

of 600 hectares in the Slim Jim Lake area forecast for the near future.

A view of these areas in six years will leave you with the feeling that you cannot see the forest for the trees.

Police Report

Officers at Schreiber Detachment have been kept busy from July 1st with a variety of occurrences.

The accident rate is down from 1984 and with increased enforcement of speed and rules of the road violations, it is anticipated the rate will remain low. This month to date, 15 Speeding charges and 2 Impaired Driving charges have been laid. A Selective Enforcement Vehicle is presently at Schreiber Detachment and will be used extensively during the summer months.

Following a fight outside a licenced premises in Schreiber, two persons were arrrested. They will appear in Provincial Court later in July.

A Break, Enter and Theft was reported at Spadoni Brothers Garage, the vehicle which was stolen has been recovered and the investigation continues.

A suitcase and a portable radio have been turned into the Detachment, the owner may claim them at any time by calling.


