Starting Young

Parents should be sure their children understand that money doesn't grow in electronic banking machines.
Young children who often watch their parents push a few buttons to get handfuls of cash, can develop irresponsible attitudes towards money. They may not realize Mom and Dad have to work hard to earn their money.
It's important for parents to teach their children about basic consumer activities, such as banking, shopping and saving. If you take the time to discuss advertisements and product choices, the child has a better chance of growing up with good spending habits.

Especially with young children at the preschool age, parents have the strongest influence, even though the youngsters will already be affected by television advertising. When you're watching a TV ad together, take a few minutes to ask your children about how they perceive the product being advertised.
Do you already own a similar product? Is it really a necessity? Do you believe it's as good as it appears on television?
Properly handled, an allowance can provide a good learning experience for a child.
If children are asked to perform certain chores in return for the allowance, they can more easily understand the concept of "earning" money.
But be sure to set guidelines from the start. If you're continually making advances and don't attach any responsibility to getting an allowance, you will be teaching the child bad habits.
Encourage the youngster to open a savings account. Many banks are becoming more responsive to dealing with children and some have even set up small counters for them.
Youngsters who continually demand you buy them "these cookies" and

"that ice cream" can be an annoyance in the grocery aisle.
But shopping can be a pleasant and educational activity for both child and parents if handled carefully from the start.
Rather than just saying "No" to the child's requests, explain why you can't buy everything on the shelves. Discuss the difference between wants and needs. Get older children involved in reading labels and make up games around finding the most nutritious foods.
I think children can understand many consumer issues if you take enough time to explain them. Don't just tell them you can't have five chocolate bars, explain that there's too much sugar in chocolate and tell them why it's not good for their health.
Allow the youngsters to make some choices, perhaps picking the breakfast cereal or fruit for the week.
If they pick a cereal they don't really like just because the box contains an interesting prize, they will have to live with their choice until it's finished. Parents who don't want their children to eat cereals with added sugar can limit the choice to a few appropriate brands.
Of course, if you don't practice what you teach, the lessons won't be as effective.
