

# Terrace Bay Council

At the regular meeting of the Council of Terrace Bay, September 23, 1985, Councillor M. Hamilton acted as Head of Council in the absence of Reeve P. Romanuk. Those present were Councillor M. Hamilton, Councillor O. Chapman, Councillor W. Houston, and Councillor George Ramsay.

A letter was received by Councillor Sandra Nash of Atikokan inviting the

Council's participation in a workshop on Council-Library Board relations to be held in Thunder Bay October 25 and 26. It was resolved that a Councillor participate.

Multicultural Association of Northwestern Ontario requests communities of Northwestern Ontario to proclaim October 13-20, 1985 to be Youth Week. The motion was passed.

Council resolved that the statement of disbursements dated September 20, 1985 in the total amount of \$483,579.64 be approved.

Council resolved By-law 24-85 being a by-law to authorize the municipality to enter into an agreement for provision of the services to a Family Resource Centre.

Council resolved that By-law 25-85 being a by-law to amend by-law number 16-85 with regards to the remuneration of the Township Engineer be passed.

Council passed a motion that By-law 27-85 be a by-law to regulate the planting and removal of trees. Council resolved that By-law 28-85 being a by-law to govern the sale of surplus goods belonging to the municipality.

Council resolved that By-law 29-85 be a by-law to authorize the Municipality to enter into agreement for joint renovation and use of the grounds of St. Martin's School.

Council resolved that the Township approve the cost of an in-pipe television inspection in the amount of an estimated cost of \$1500.00 on East Grove Crescent re sewer blockage, if necessary as requested by the Township Engineer.

Council resolved that the Township approve an estimated cost of \$500.00 for the repairs to Fire Pumper No. 1 to be done by a serviceman from Springall Services of Woodstock.

Council resolved that a member of Council be authorized to attend the Emergency Measures Organization Executive Sub-Committee in Thunder Bay, September 26th at the Township's expense.

Councillor M. Hamilton declared "conflict of interest" when discussion was on grading of Scott Avenue - Doug Baker will look at this road.

The first Council meeting in October will be October 15th as October 14th is a holiday.
