Falconbridge Project halted

Toronto, November 1, 1985 — Corporation Falconbridge Copper announced today it is suspending development of its Winston Lake zinc property near Schreiber in Northwestern Ontario, where ore reserves of 2,177,000 tonnes grading 18 per cent zinc and 1 per cent copper have been delineated.

This decision was made because of sharply deteriorating zinc prices combined with higher smelter charges which result in substantially reduced revenue for the mine. These adverse conditions are caused in part by the anticipated reactivation of a major Yukon zinc producer.

In September, the Company announced its decision to bring the Winston Lake property into production at a cost of \$52.5 million on the assumption that current zinc surpluses would be absorbed by 1987.

Work already commissioned will be completed. Further development is postponed until an improvement takes place in the supply-demand balance of zinc.
